Special Guests' Bios

Leroy Logan M.B.E.

Leroy Logan M.B.E. is a retired Metropolitan Police Superintendent, co-founder of the Black Police Association, and co-founder and former Consultant Director of the London ACEs Hub (LAH) CIC. With decades of experience in policing and advocacy, Leroy is widely recognised for his work addressing racial inequality. A respected commentator on policing and Black communities, he has consistently called for fairness, accountability, and systemic reform. His lived and professional experience bring a vital perspective to conversations on racial justice and community cohesion.

Leroy is the author of *Closing Ranks: My Life as a Cop*, and his story inspired the acclaimed *Red, White and Blue* film in Steve McQueen's *Small Axe* series.

He has championed trauma-responsive approaches to public services, particularly policing, emphasising the role of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) in shaping outcomes and building more compassionate and equitable systems and communities.

Mark Crick

Born and raised in Bermondsey in the 1970s, Mark Crick grew up as part of one of the first Black families in an area marked by economic decline and rising racial tension, with the National Front active nearby. These early experiences shaped his understanding of systemic racism and the realities of navigating institutions that often positioned Black people at a disadvantage. As a first-generation British-born individual of St Lucian heritage, his journey has been one of resilience, adaptation, and purpose. He learned early the need to exceed expectations and navigate different spaces with care. Mark now works within Children's Services, where he focuses on addressing the impact of racial inequality and building local anti-racist practice. He is committed to creating pathways for future generations and challenging the narratives that divide communities. His work is grounded in a clear belief: that meaningful change requires honest conversations about race, equity, and justice.

Muna Abdi

Dr Muna Abdi is a researcher, consultant, leadership coach and speaker, working at the intersection of leadership, community accountability, racial equity and organisational change. She is the founder of MA Research and Partnerships and creator of the CORE Framework, developed to strengthen ethical relationships between institutions and the communities they serve. The framework is founded upon core components of Community, Accountability, Reciprocity and Ethics.

Combining evidence, lived experience and practical insight, Muna's work is research-informed, psychologically grounded and rooted in the belief that meaningful change requires both personal transformation and structural accountability.
